**MEETING MINUTES  
PARK BOARD  
CITY OF PECULIAR, MISSOURI  
November 12, 2013**

A regular meeting of the Park Board of the City of Peculiar, Missouri was held in the Council Chambers of the Municipal Building on Tuesday, November 12, 2013, beginning at 6:30 P.M. Park Board / BOA Liaison Homer Dunsworth called the meeting to order at 6:34.

**Pledge of Allegiance**

**Members Responding to Roll Call**

Members present for the roll call include: Alderman Homer Dunsworth, Member Chris Green, Member Brian Boyd, and Member Andrew Boston. Members Kelsie McCrea, Kasey King and Doug Stark were not present. Director Musteen was also present.

**Consideration of Agenda and Minutes**

Member Boyd made a motion to accept the meeting minutes of October 2013. Member Boston seconded the motion and the motion carried with a 4-0 voice vote.

**Officer Elections**

Member Boyd nominated Andrew Boston for Park Board Chair. Member Greene seconded the nomination. Motion carried with a 3-0 voice vote.

**Director's Report**

Director Musteen reported that there was no old or new business to report due to the October meeting being only 2 weeks ago. Not much has changed since the last meeting.

Charlie's Battle charity run was held on Saturday, November 9<sup>th</sup>. Alderman Turner, Park Board Member McCrea and Director Musteen attended the event. Director Musteen stated that the event went well overall. Between 30 and 40 runners attended the event with the addition of several other participating in the walking portion of the event. The trail system was well received and Director Musteen was pleased with the trails.

Director Musteen explained the steps for the Raisbeck Trail process. Director Musteen received a letter stating the status of the grant is now in Washington D.C. for final approval. He has been informed that once your application has reached Washington D.C., you should be granted the project. At this time we are waiting on a phone call or a letter stating that we can begin work on the trail. Discussion ensues on the trail project.

Director Musteen has a meeting scheduled with Land3 to discuss the timeline of the renovation project now that the permits have been approved. We want to put together a timeline with bidding and construction schedules that represents the priorities of the board. He will discuss options of splitting the construction up into parts to allow for construction on one-half the complex while games can be played on the other half and then flip-flop to finish construction.

Basketball Registrations are finished. Now we are finalizing the online registration process. Being our trial season, we've ironed out all the kinks. There was one glitch with a few online registrations that we will fix. Registrations from the school flyers now have to be inputted manually in the online scheduling program. Director Musteen will send out a mass email to all registered players and set up a coaches meeting. Discussion ensued regarding team numbers, player placement procedures and league details. Member Boston commented that three teams was a good turnout for the first year. Director Musteen agreed and stated that we knew it would start small and word of mouth and yearly anticipation would provide growth in the future. Musteen also stated that being a self-sustaining league would be difficult, even Raymore at nearly 20,000 people still shares games. But, if we fill two or three teams in a division, that would be a good representation. Discussion ensues...

Parks Report – mowing is done for the season. We have re-opened Raisbeck Park to the public at the Mayor's request due to the delay in construction. We will mow Raisbeck one last time and do some minor playground improvements due to neglect and unsafe play features. The park is open for public use, but it is pretty neglected which is why we are putting money into it so that we can do something with it. McKernan bathrooms have been winterized and shut down for the winter. General clean-up of the woods at Raisbeck will begin now that colder weather has killed weeds and ticks. Member Dunsworth asked if we will be using Excalibur and their contract to do work and avoid prevailing wage. Director Musteen confirmed that he and Excalibur will be doing most of the clean-up in the woods. We did one big clean-up in June, but another flood has washed up more tree debris and we will continue with the wooded area clean-up. We will rent a chipper to mulch the tree debris and provide general mulch for the entire park system.

Director Musteen stated that next month in December we will be back on our 2<sup>nd</sup> Monday of the month meeting schedule. Discussion ensued regarding holiday schedule and regular meeting nights.

A motion was made by Member Boyd, seconded by Member Dunsworth, to adjourn the meeting. The motion carried with a 4-0 voice vote at 6:55 p.m.

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### BACKGROUND

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On July 29<sup>th</sup>, the Park Board met to discuss the Park Fund balance allocations in preparation for the 2013/2014 Budget. The proposed budget was voted unanimously for recommendation to the Board of Alderman and is now in effect.

An all-purpose utility vehicle was included in the Capital Purchase items for this fiscal year with a budget amount of \$10,000. Staff began quoting the utility vehicle in November. Quotes received for the Bobcat, Ranger, Gator and Kubota RTV came in between \$13,000 to \$20,000 price range.

After further research of how other sports facility's use these vehicles verses the costs involved, it was recommended to research and price a small compact tractor. These tractors have the versatility of the UTV's but have more horse power with the optional front end loader and rear implement attachments. These light-weight tractors can do general athletic field maintenance such as goal setting and removing and general dirt/turf work with optional rear implement attachments that the UTV's cannot do.

Available implements to be purchased or rented for use include: Underbelly mower deck, pull behind brush hog, tiller, spreader, seeder, auger, rear blade, box blade, cultivator disc and back-hoe.

This compact tractor will be used to rotate and move soccer goals and be used for field maintenance. In addition, this piece of equipment can be used throughout the entire park system, to build and do maintenance on trails and light enough to be hauled using the park truck & trailer.

Initial research compared the Kubota BX2370 and the John Deere 2032R compact tractors. The Kubota was significantly cheaper with more available implements and a solid steel body. The John Deere has a fiberglass shell.

## 2013 Kubota BX2370 HST Review

### BX Series gets a facelift

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**Kubota's BX series has been the top selling subcompact of the last decade, and for good reason. Starting with powerful and reliable Kubota-manufactured diesel powerplants that are matched to durable hydrostatic transmissions and placed into well-designed, compact platforms; the end result is exactly what has made this segment of the tractor marketplace explode.**

These are machines made to do serious work but are still easy to operate, come with pricing relatively easy on ones wallet, and at the end of the day are something a proud owner might wash and wax as carefully as a favorite automobile.



The BX 70 Series is made up of four models, the 18-horsepower BX1870, the 23 horsepower BX2370, the 23 horsepower BX25D (a factory tractor-loader-backhoe set up), and the 25.5 horsepower BX2670. All are three-cylinder designs with displacements ranging from 43.9 to 61.1 ci. Our BX2370 tractor came with a D902 54.8 ci variant that is rated to deliver 17.7 horsepower at the power take off (PTO) at 3200 rpm. Mated to a two-range hydrostatic transmission operated by a treadle foot pedal, the set up allows infinite control over the 0-8.4 mph forward and 0-6.5 mph reverse speed capability.

BX Series tractors come standard with mid (2500 rpm) and rear (540 rpm) PTOs. The system used is a live independent type that is engaged using a wet hydraulic clutch. While treadle pedals are not our most desired method of controlling tractor forward and reverse travel, Kubota's system is well laid out, easy to use, easy to get used to, and nicely modulated. We also appreciate the layout of the front pedal which can be operated if so desired by pushing down to go forward and then slipping a toe underneath and lifting the pedal to reverse direction. For those who prefer, a heel pedal can accomplish the same direction change.



Kubota's new 70 Series get a big improvement in the brake department. In the past the brake pedal has been located above the right side treadle pedal, which made it impossible to use to aid in turning or getting unstuck. Now positioned as a left foot pedal, the arrangement becomes fully functional, and is no longer just a parking brake.

The operator's platform is an area that has been greatly refined. Not only is the relocation of the brake pedal a big improvement, but the steering wheel is also in a much better position. Operators will find the floor entirely flat and rubber isolated, so you can comfortably stretch out. And the treadle toe and heel are connected below the deck for added space. The high visibility dash is another area of refinement, with the analog tach located on the left side and a modern LCD readout (white background with black increments) on the right. In between are warning lights for PTO engagement, battery, headlights, turn signals and low fuel.

Kubota engineers didn't ignore the seat when it came to refinements. Featuring a new high-back design, the seat is fully padded and has molded lumbar sides to keep the operator comfortably in place. As well, the seatback now reclines and arm rests are standard.



Levers are color coded and ergonomically positioned. From the operator's seat, controls for 2WD/4WD, cruise, PTO, loader and three-point hitch (3PH) are all within easy reach. One quibble we have is that the 3PH uses a quarter inching valve rather than position control. Though the system works well enough, it still leaves us wishing for more.

Making it easier to store BX tractors in smaller sheds and garages, the roll over protection system (ROPS) now folds on every BX model. Other cab features include a cupholder, 12V DC outlet and two well-positioned grab handles. A toolbox is available as an option. Headlamps are halogen.

Powering the 3PH on the BX2370 is a single hydraulic pump flowing 6.2 gpm to power steering and implement needs. Cat 1 lift capacity is rated at 680 lbs at 24" behind pin. Our test tractor was equipped with the BX25D loader and the quick attach bucket option. This nifty feature makes it quick and easy to swap from a bucket to a pallet fork or a front blade. The BX25D is a curved boom design for better visibility and the hoses are all located inside the arms for protection. Rated to lift 745 lbs to a full lift height of 71.3", we measured dump clearance at 52.4" which is quite competitive for this segment but might put those high bed sides on your pickup out of reach. Time to raise from the ground to full height was 3.5 seconds, lowering back down took 2.7 seconds, curling took 2.4 seconds and dump time was 1.7 seconds – not bad considering the pump output. Dig depth is 4.7".



Along with the loader, our test tractor came with a 60" standard cut mower deck. We immediately noted the 6" of clearance the BX now has when the deck is in transport position. The added clearance might be enough in many cases to leave the mower deck on when doing loader work and not risk having your mower become an expensive skid plate. Cut height is adjustable using a dial height knob. Kubota offers five mid-mount deck options ranging from fine cut models in 48" and 54" widths to the 60" deck our tractor was equipped with. All decks are shaft-driven, stamped one-piece designs that are easily removed or attached.

The turf tires on our test tractor were size 18 x 1.5-10 at the front and 26 x 12-12 at the rear. R1 Ag and R4 Industrial options are available. For most applications they would be fine, but if you plan on loader work in muddy conditions, consider going with R4s which are a good compromise and offer better traction with less turf damage than R1s.

MSRP for our test tractor (tractor, loader valve, turf tires, 60" deck, loader, ballast box and quick attach bucket system) ran just under \$17,000. Other options if we were ordering this machine might include pallet forks (\$338), a dealer installed grille guard (\$162) and LED fender and ROPS lights (\$198/set).

The BX2370 measures 95.5" long x 44.5" wide and rides on a 55.1" wheelbase. With the ROPS in the raised position, the height is 87.2". Ground clearance is 8.7".

Kubota backs each BX used in consumer applications with a bumper-to-bumper warranty for 24 months or 1500 hours. Powertrain warranty is extended to 36 months or 2000 hours.

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### GENERAL INFORMATION

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Staff has drafted a Sportsmanship Policy to help guide the Parks & Recreation department in establishing a set of standards and rules of behaviors while participating in a sports league or activity as a coach, player, spectator, staff or general observer. These standards and rules of behavior shall apply for any sports league/ activity in a Peculiar park or sports facility. Coaches and players participating in a game or activity traveling to a location outside of Peculiar City limits will be held to these standards as representatives of the City.

This policy shall provide guidance to the Department and Park Board in determining appropriate consequences when the policy is violated.

The policy will be reviewed during coaches meetings and included in coach's packets. It will also be made available on the city website.

### SPORTSMANSHIP POLICY

Location:  
Agency:

Cass County, Missouri,  
Peculiar Parks and Recreation Department

#### **I. STATEMENT OF NEED**

The Peculiar Parks and Recreation Board (“Board”) recognizes it is a high priority for the Peculiar Parks and Recreation Department (“Department”) to provide a safe and positive environment for the City’s youth to participate in sports and recreational activities.

#### **II. AUTHORITY AND RESPONSIBILITY**

The Peculiar Park Board carries the primary responsibility to recommend policies to govern the operation and programs of the Parks and Recreation Department, assist in planning activities and events, and give guidance for expansion of parks and recreation facilities.

#### **III. STATEMENT OF PHILOSOPHY**

The basic philosophy of the Peculiar Parks and Recreation Board is one of Zero Tolerance for violent, discriminatory, or abusive behavior during all sports leagues and events held on City of Peculiar property.

Recognizing that the Youth Sports Organizations operating within the City limits and City sponsored leagues and activities have taken an active role in the process of adherence to a higher standard of sportsmanship in youth sports, the Peculiar Parks and Recreation Board members entrust the implementation of the zero tolerance policy to the Peculiar Parks & Recreation Department.

The Department shall serve as primary governing body for the safety and enjoyment of all youth sports programs. Cooperating jointly with the Peculiar Park Board, the Department will use a process that includes the review of individual incident reports, policy review and recommendations and an appeals procedure on an “as need” basis.

The Peculiar Park Board shall assist the Department Staff in taking a proactive stance on sportsmanship by supporting the Department as the professional educator for youth sport coaches and parents through the implementation of an aggressive and educational Coaches certification program.

#### **IV. ZERO TOLERANCE POLICY**

1. Any player, coach, spectator, or official using any kind of abusive, discriminatory, or threatening gesture and or language will be ejected from the game and asked to leave the facility. A second offense will result in suspension from the facility for the season.

2. Any coach, spectator, or official allowing or encouraging foul, abusive, or threatening language or behavior by players will be ejected from the game and asked to leave the facility. A second offense will result in a one-year suspension from all activities.
3. Any player, coach, spectator, or official using alcohol or any other illegal substance within the facility during a game, practice, or other league or team event where players are present will be automatically ejected from the facility. A second offense will result in a one-year suspension from all activities.
4. Any player, coach, spectator, or official striking or causing bodily assault will be automatically ejected from the game, asked to leave the facility, and suspended from all activities for one year. A second offense will result in a lifetime suspension from all activities.
5. Any coach, knowingly requiring or allowing a player to play while having a serious injury, or knowingly creating unsafe playing conditions will automatically be suspended for the season.
6. Any coach, spectator or player causing interference with the conduct of the game will result in a warning. A second offense will result in ejection from the game and facility.
7. Any coach, spectator or player using inappropriate or degrading language randomly or directed at another individual will result in a warning. A second offense will result in ejection from the game and facility.
8. **Enforcement Procedure:**
  - a. Any full-time park department employee (Park Director, Recreation Coordinator, Park Foreman, or Park Maintenance Worker) may enforce this policy at any sports event held on City property.
  - b. Any contract Parks & Recreation Department staff member (site supervisor, league director or other supervisory position assigned by the Parks Director) may enforce this policy at any sports event held on City property.
  - c. Any Youth Sports Organization official or board member may enforce this policy during that organization's events.
  - d. If the offense is severe, or if the behavior persists, the Peculiar Police Department may be called for assistance.
  - e. An incident report form (attachment A) must be completed on-site at the time of the incident by the league representative present at the event.
9. **Review:**
  - a. Each incident report will be reviewed by the Department. Decisions related to suspension, adjustment of league rules, and/or facility conditions must be documented.
  - b. All department and youth sport organizations' incident report forms including any recommendations will be reviewed by the Department.
  - c. The Peculiar Park Board will review incident reports and Department or youth sports organization recommendations during its regular monthly meeting when applicable. Any recommendations for change in Board policy or facility considerations will be shared with the Board members during the regular monthly meeting.
10. **Appeals:**
  - a. All appeals of decisions made by the Parks & Recreation Department must be made in writing and delivered to the City of Peculiar Parks and Recreation Department within ten calendar days of the official decision.
  - b. Appeals will be heard by the Peculiar Park Board or an assigned sub-committee consisting of a minimum of three Park Board members. The person making the appeal will be entitled to meet with this committee and present any evidence relevant to the incident(s) documented by the Department or youth sports organization.

- c. The Park Board or assigned sub-committee will render its decision in writing. All decisions shall be final. If the assigned sub-committee decision is not unanimous, a second appeal may be forwarded to the full Park Board for final decision at the next regularly scheduled meeting. All enforced consequences will remain in effect until the Park Board has convened.

## **V. SPORTSMANSHIP EDUCATION**

### **1. Training and Certification Requirements**

- a. All Youth Sports Organizations or City sponsored leagues using City of Peculiar parks and sports facilities shall be required to provide educational training for the certification of all head coaches in their youth leagues.
- b. All Youth Sports Organizations or City sponsored leagues using City of Peculiar parks and sports facilities shall provide the same opportunity for assistant coaches to attend a sportsmanship training session offered in conjunction with head coach certification.
- c. Certification and training shall be through a nationally recognized certification program such as "*Positive Coaching Alliance (PCA)*" or "*National Youth Sports Coaches' Association (NYSCA)*". The program shall be offered at a minimum of two times per year for coach training. The Peculiar Park Board encourages this training to be offered per sport season or online at the convenience of the coach.

## **VI. YOUTH SPORTS ORGANIZATIONS**

All Youth Sports Organizations using City of Peculiar parks or sports facilities must report coaches' training and certifications, and all Zero Tolerance violations from article IV of this policy to the Peculiar Parks & Recreation Department.

## **VII. PENALTY**

Any Youth Sports Organization not adhering to the spirit of the policy, as determined by the Peculiar Park Board, shall be prohibited from using City of Peculiar facilities. Any Youth Sports Organization not requiring coaches' training and certification, or not reporting incidents of inappropriate behavior to the Peculiar Parks & Recreation Department shall be prohibited from using City of Peculiar facilities.

Any Coach, Player or Spectator on City of Peculiar parks or sports facilities that violate the guidelines and regulations set forth by this policy will adhere to the consequences as deemed appropriate by the Parks & Recreation Director and the Peculiar Park Board.

Any coach or player violating rules 1 – 7 in Section IV – Zero Tolerance while participating in a City sponsored league/event and representing the City of Peculiar located outside of Peculiar City Limits will be held accountable to the same consequences as if the action had taken place on City of Peculiar parks or sports facilities.

Violations of the above policy will be handled in accordance with penalties set forth. However, Peculiar Parks and Recreation and the Peculiar Parks and Recreation Board reserve the right to impose penalties greater than those outlined if a situation dictates, based on severity. We further reserve the right to suspend coaching, player and spectator privileges where appropriate.

## **VII. SUPPORTING DOCUMENT**

Individual league manuals may have established sportsmanship rules within the governing rulebook. This City of Peculiar Sportsmanship Policy is designed to either support or further enhance each established sport specific rulebook for the safety and welfare of participants, spectators, volunteers and league staff.

## **VIII. ANNUAL REVIEW**

The Peculiar Park Board shall review this Sportsmanship Policy as needed to ensure the best possible service to the public.
